VARIOUS ARTISTS WARPED TOUR 2009 COMPILATION (Side One Dummy) Just like KUCI, Warped Tour celebrated an anniversary this year, their 15th to be exact. We got a couple decades on them, but nonetheless this compilation features great songs from Bad Religion, NOFX, and Flogging Molly, as well as newcomers like The Flatliners hitting the stage as well. Pick up this CD to hold you off

MOUNT EERIE WIND'S POEM (P.W. Elverum & Sun). Ex-Microphone Phil Elverum unleashes his inner black metal-teer and vanced natura and Twin Pasks. Alternating between mountain-eroding waves of sound and whisper-quiet acoustic passages, Phil m about nature and Twin Peaks. Alternating bets (P.S. Special Agent Cooper is a GOD). — kO

ANTI-FLAG THE PEOPLE OR THE GUN (Side One Dummy) Political punks Anti-Flag are at it again with another exp turn their focus onto the current state of the economy. This is what Punk is all about. — bH

NOUVELLE VAGUE NV3 (Peacefrog) Everything sounds better with a French accent. Nouvelle Vague cover the expected (Violent Fernmes, Go-Go's) and the more obscure (Magazine, Plastic Bertrand), but the ooh la la are the duets with the original singers including Depoche Mode's Martin Gore and Echo and the Bunnymen's lan McCulloch. GIA DINH <<BA PHO>> QUE HUONG (Felmay) Bells chime as clearly as the purest water, dripping elegantly out of the speakers over a foundation of delicate but commanding percussion and ethnic instrumentation. A masterfully recorded collection of Vietnamese folk music without any pretension or kitsch, emotive and jubilant. Get this and everything else on from the exceedingly great Felmay records. — sF



ZE 30 ZE RECORDS STORY 1979-2009 (Strut) Post-Punk, No Wave, Mutant Disco. Whatever you call the genre, ZE Records was the highly influential label of artists such as James Chance and the Contortions, Suicid and Cristina. This retrospective features rarities and even a few contemporary releases from the venerable ZE catalog. — rG

MAMA ROSIN BLACK ROBERT (Gutfeeling) The fifth album from this amazing Cajun trio, recorded in an old barn with few overdubs, draws inspiration from, among others, The Clash, slave writings found in Martinique, and the great John Delafose. Ca c'est bon! — jB

YO LA TENGO POPULAR SONGS (Matador) If there were a place called "Indie Rock University," a campus of hory tower rock academics with rolling greens and the best college radio station in the universe, their mascot would probably be the Fightin "to La Tengos. Over their 20- year career, they've examined and dissected "guitar-based indie rock" with the methodology of a scientist, and a sense of humor and intelligence that is unmatched. In NJ trio is quite possibly THE face of college rock. —kO This NJ tri

THE ANTLERS HOSPICE (Frenchisss) How the hell does this album manage to be simultaneously both subtle and epic the same time. It's like watching a forest grow in time-lapse photography. Slow, whispered songs about hospice care turn from vulnerable confessions into massive edifices of emotion and power. — kO



MAGIK MARKERS BALF QUARRY (Drag City) The cult noise makers are back with their most accessible release to date. Balf Quarry shows that under the loud guitars and drums they have a knack for penning unforgettable lyrics as well. — hM





THE BEST OF 40 YEARS

1968 THE VELVET UNDERGROUND WHITE LIGHT/WHITE HEAT (Verve) This is for real. This is the holy grail of the middle finger to everything that made sense. Drop the stylus on side A, hear the pop jam. Everything's cool as 1968 — the sound of wearing a leather jacket and happily shooting up. Flip it over and feel the sound of the vinyl harshly and crudely wearing down your needle. Guitars like amplified chainsaws, no semblance of truly foundational structure, Lou Reed wailing about demonic wailing. And then the clincher. The most infamous closing track ever. More than a quarter-hour of aggressively mantric rock music, a black tunnel with no end and broken fluorescent lights, a too-happy chord progression fumbling down a broken winding staircase, fleshed out with earsplitting haphazard organ solos that could care less about key and timing. Some disgusting drug orgy in some parallel universe, someone gets shot; the folks in the song's narrative are no doubt gleefully destroying themselves while somehow in some sort of broken fractal listening to this song. — Sam Farzin

1975 STEVE REICH MUSIC FOR 18 MUSICIANS (ECM) Three years in the making, this seminal trance pulse piece is the Star Child of Apollo and Dionysus — a ceremony to a blank slate rebirth of non-Western anti-climax notions. Vibraphones chime the changes of movement at random, choruses of bells signaling the players — pianos, marimbas, xylophones, metallophone, wordless women's voices, violins, cellors, clairnets and bass clarinets — to switch their joyful human clockwork harmonies in a timeless universe, creating a sacred space to get lost and found in. — Arturo Bandini

1979 THE CLASH LONDON CALLING (Epic) While everything Punk is controversial, The Clash's album London Calling is arguably one of the greatest and most influential albums for future generations of Punk and sub-genres, and is my personal favorite album of the past 40 years. In addition to the unmatchable vocal stylings of Joe Strummer, this album is revolutionary because it's not afraid to break the boundaries of the Punk genre and venture into Rockabilly, Reggae, and Lounge. A MUST for Punk followers. — Breesa

1991 MR. BUNGLE MR. BUNGLE (Warner Bros.) The album starts out aggressively with the track "Quote Unquote" and explores uncharted musical regions with tracks like "Egg" and "Love is a Fist." The only shortcoming is that the craziness of the "Quote Unquote" music video does not translate to radio waves. — Daniel Johnson

1998 NEUTRAL MILK HOTEL IN THE AEROPLANE OVER THE SEA (Merge) Equal parts heartbreakingly sad and beautiful, this monument to the possibilities of pop music gains more and more fans every year. Poetic, fun, fuzzy, adventurous, exciting, and tascinated with Anne Frank, Jeff Mangum's magnum opus is completely singular in my album library. — Kyle Olson

2008 BJ DOUGGPOUND - POUND IT! (EP) - Part one: classic knock knock jokes from everything from hemorrhoids to Terry Gross. Part two: REEEEEMIX! Part one + Part two: A new comedy experience that will make you rethink life as you know it.

March 1968 KUCI's first station Manager Craig Will begins broadcasting from Mesa court using an AM transmitter.

March 21, 1969 UCI applies to the FCC for authority to construct a radio station on campus using the call letters "KUCI". Other choices considered were KZOT, KAAL, KUCF and KUCM.

May 1, 1969 Led Zeppelin appears in concert at UCI's Crawford Hall.

September 12, 1969 Station engineer Earl Arbuckle feeds power to the KUCI FM transmitter for the first time at 1:35 am. The first song played during the test is "Get Together" by the Youngbloods.

October 16, 1969 Earl Arbuckle conducts KUCl's first FM on-air test. The studio at the time is inside a small closet in the Physical Science Building. Evening-only broadcasts feature records from the disc jockeys' own collections. The first song ever played on KUCl is "Sugar, Sugar" by the Archies. The first legal show is broadcast — Station Manager Gregg Wolford's "Problems of the World Solved Tonight."

November 8, 1969 First KUCI fund-raiser. Fellini's movie "8-1/2" is shown at the Science Lecture Hall for 75 cents.

November 25, 1969 It's official! FCC grants KUCI a station license.

April 1971 Construction begins on the third floor of UCI's Gateway Commons for studio and office space. By the fall of 1971, KUCI moves. At this time, the station's music library consists of 400 records.

November 1971 KUCI increases its effective radiated power from 10 watts to 24 watts and is on the

1973 KUCI broadcasts the Beach Boys concert from Crawford Hall live. KUCI General Manager Ralph Hawkins completes 72-hour marathon radio show. Rod Serling interviewed on KUCI. Founding UCI Chancellor Dan Aldrich starts a 15-minute weekly round-table discussion radio show.

August 8, 1974 KUCI broadcasts Richard Nixon's resignation speech live.

January 1975 KUCI's management establishes a 24/7 schedule.

January 31, 1975 Doug Kenny, editor-in-chief of National Lampoon speaks at UCI and then at KUCI. Gary Stone's documentary "The KUCI Story" premiers at the speech.

Summer 1976 KUCI news staff drives to Kansas City Republican National Convention, feeding news and interviews to the station.

1977 Current classical DJ Michael Rydzynski begins his tenure at KUCI.

January 28, 1979 Billboard magazine features an article on KUCI.

1979 Punk rock band X plays at Patogh the Persian coffee shop on campus. KUCI record library estimated at 14,000 albums.

August 27, 1980 KUCI and Radio 88 in Stockholm Sweden exchange live programming.

September 26, 1980 Monty Python at KUCI.



March 14, 1981 KUCI virtually disappears from the airwaves as KCRW 89.9 fm boosts its power by shifting its antenna to Mt. Wilson.

September 1, 1981 KUCI begins broadcasting at 88.9 FM.

November 1983 KUCI begins broadcasting UCI basketball away games.

1984 KUCI holds a series of benefit concerts featuring TSOL, The Call, Josie Cotton and M.I.A. at the Concert Factory in Costa Mesa. KUCI Mobile DJ or "Rent a Jock" service created.

October 12, 1984 Red Hot Chili Peppers in-studio interview.

January 11, 1985 Suicidal Tendencies in-studio interview.

1986 City of Irvine selects KUCI as the emergency radio station for the city.

Aug 1987 KUCI broadcasts live Irvine vs Taiwan Little League World Championships from Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Irvine loses.

July 1988 KUCI purchases its first CD player. KUCI record library estimated at 30,000 albums

May 4, 1990 No Doubt plays KUCI Benefit concert at UCI.

November 11-18, 1991 KUCI holds its first on-air fundraising drive.

March 6, 1992 Mike Watt in-studio interview.

March 15, 1993 KUCI becomes a 200 watt stereo station and plays "Sugar, Sugar" again to celebrate the event.

December 21, 1993 Senator Barbara Boxer slams soon-to-be Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas on KUCI in-studio interview.

July 1994 KUCI moves from UCI's Gateway Commons to Humanities Annex trailer, while Gateway Commons gets earthquake retrofitting.

January 1995 KUCI's first benefit CD is released.



February 16, 1995 "In the past century, radio stations have changed the way we think about the world. KUCI-FM is an important part of this tradition, giving citizens immediate access to the events that shape our times and opening new doors to understanding. July 1, 2001 Rilo Kiley performs at KUCI.

October 4, 2003 Plain White Ts performs at KUCI.

March 23, 2004 KUCl broadcasts former leader of the Soviet Union and a Nobel Peace Prize laureate Mikhail Gorbachev live from the Irvine Barclay Theatre.

March-April 2004 KUCI moves to its current location behind the UCI Science Library.

April 16, 2004 KUCI broadcasts Dalai Lama public talk at UCI.

November 5, 2005 KUCI broadcasts David Lynch from the UCI Student Center.

May 3, 2007 KUCI broadcasts President Jimmy Carter live from the Bren Center.

December 13, 2007 The Airborne Toxic Event performs at KUCI.
