A L B U M R E V I E W NICOLE MITCHELL - ICE CRYSTAL

Standing on shifting shores of kaleidoscopic melodies, hopping signatures time like passing clouds shuttling across some southside mindscape, integrat-

ing momentous nervous tics talk tick tock thick talk think clock tuning turning tumbling....

UCI prof and composer Nicole Mitchell takes the ancient pipe breath voice called a flute and meanders like some stream from Olympus's source through melodies timeless and timely, journeying with the bell (wake up) alarums of vibes from Jason Adasiewicz, the nimble prodding digits of bassist Joshua Abrams which reach the deep tissue in the cerebellum (or when bowing slowly tighten like the grip of a comforting yet lethal muffler around the neck) and the AR 15 with an endless clip wielded by drummer (when not whispering sweet nothing at all on the ride and high hat) Frank Rosaly.

Chicago's jazz scene has a tradition of genre bending (Sun Ra, Art Ensemble of Chicago, The Association For the Advancement of Creative Musicians (Mitchell has been president of same), Leroy Jenkins, Roscoe Mitchell and among the younger generation, Rob Mazurek, Excploding Star Orchestra etc. She brings her fresh non categorical approach to this campus by teaching in the Integrated Improvisation Composition and Technology program in the music department.

The CD, "Aquarius", is so purely musical that you forget to compare it to any style. Classical... world... jazz... none and all of the above is all I can say. The playing is gorgeous. Standouts... well "Sunday Afternoon" and "Fred Anderson" swing and come closest to what folks call jazz, but I am especially fond of the title cut "Aquarius" and "Today Today".

A L B U M R E V I E W LOCAL NATIVES - HUMMINGBIRD

After almost a year of a sneaky message gracing the homepage of the Local Natives' website ("We are making a new record."), the built-up anticipation has finally been released. The follow-up to their debut album, Gorilla Manor, Local Natives decides to take a more serious approach to their sound with Hummingbird (1/29).

Composed of eleven songs, the album is a series of tunes that seem to lack a strong drum influence, unlike the previous. With this, listeners have instead to listen to lead singer and guitarists Taylor Rice and Kelsey Ayer experiment with their vocal ranges.

The opening track, "You & I," begins with powerful high notes and extends to "Three Months," comprised of almost entirely falsetto notes. In fact, a majority of the album presents a series of high notes and falsetto, adding onto the talent that the two already displayed with their frequent use of harmonies in Gorilla Manor.

Despite the slowed tempo in these tracks, one can look forward to something a bit faster and toe-tapping with "Black Balloons" and "Breakers." The hit single off the album, "Breakers'" music video features glittering, aesthetically pleasing shots combined with members of the band rolling "backwards" (up) hills.

Overall, listeners can expect a different different tone throughout the entire album. However, this does not deter from their sound. Despite the serious tones, Local Natives still delivers full heart into each track. The instrumentals may take a less orchestral tone than Gorilla Manor, but it does not transform them into any other sort of band otherwise.

Playing this album, I cannot doubt that it still has traces of a classic sound that they have created all within one album. Hummingbird utilizes this sound as an opportunity to experiment with darker moods, while still staying true to Local Natives' "feel." Listeners, purchase this album in hard cover. Elaborate artwork, packaging, and harmonies await you.

SHOW REVIEW: KISHI BASHI @ THE TROUBADOUR, LOS ANGELES 3/1/13

One year after his release of his debut album 151a, K. Ishibashi's magestic solo project Kishi Bashi has began to cause some well-deserved notice and recognition by the indie and popular music scenes. His live show, a combination of psychadelic violin loops, vocal experimentation, and dazzling beat boxing, is an espectacle that breaks expectations and leaves a sense of awe and appreciation to the dying art of virtuoso-style music.

After landging a spot on a Windows 8 commercial with his single "Bright Whites", Kishi Bashi has began an extensive North American tour to promote his music and acquire a larger fanbase. I first stumbled upon Kishi Bashi while doing an OPI review on his debut album. Astonished by his proper use of Asian melodies mixed with Classical and Folk techniques, I instantly knew that this artist could only get better in time. Almost an entire year later, he has gathered a resume which includes spots in FYF Festival, SXSW, commercials for Sony and Smart Car,





and a sold-out shows in North America and Asia. Most recenly he has toured Southern California and sold out The Troubadour on his first official LA debut, which I was very lucky to attend thanks to a press pass provided by his respresentative.

The concert, which included an opening act by banjo/folk-rock group Tall Tall Trees, was a dazzling show of passion, musicality, talent, and charisma. Tall Tall Trees proved to be an adequate opener and provided a neat set of folk music that has been featured in a few American sitcoms and TV shows such as "Two and a Half Men" and "American Pickers". Kishi Bashi included the entire repertoire of his debut album in an almost improv-like style; switching keys and adding beatbox beats, extra verses, fan-interactions, dancing, clapping, and plenty of energy to add an extra dimension to the studio songs. The show also included a few covers and a new unnamed song which has charted in Japan. "Bright Whites", "Atticus, In The Dessert", and "Manchester" were the concert's highlights and recommended tracks to anyone listening to Kishi Bashi for the first time. With his appearances in both Asia and America in the Marketing department, it is only a matter of tiem until Kishi Bashi breaks into the mainstream side of indie music. Kishi Bashi is set to tour the rest of North America in the next few months and plans to release a 2nd EP later this year.

SHOW REVIEW : EL TEN ELEVEN @ THE CONSTELLATION ROOM, SANTA ANA 1/24/13

El Ten Eleven made a local stop at The Constellation Room in Santa Ana on January 24 as part of their Winter Tour 2013, promotionally for their October 2012 release, Transitions. Nestled next to The Observatory, the duo managed to gather up a fairly large crowd despite the neighboring Led Zeppelin Tribute show. This, somehow, gave them the mindset that it was permissible for them to leave fans sitting through two opening acts lasting close to three hours before they finally made their appearance. However, it still proved to be a great performance, various lights and cinematic accompaniment overall creating an intense ambiance that allowed fans to truly immerse themselves in the post-rock stylings of Tim Fogarty and Kristian Dunn.

Dunn was continuously switching from double neck to single neck guitars, adding to the talent that that two clearly displayed throughout the two hour set. Dunn had a respectable on-stage presence, regularly thanking the audience for being there and creating an energy that demanded their attention. Fogarty, on the other hand, decided to lie back and let Dunn do the talking, but that didn't stop him from pounding on his drums and playing with the synthesizer as if his life depended on it. Together, they established a consistent rthymn with each other that one could tell they had worked on for years to develop.

The night was a success, and every song from Transitions to Jumping Frenchmen of Maid (cinematic accompaniment involving fight scenes from old movies set the mood for this one) was performed at full throttle. I definitely lost track of what point in their songs we'd be at during certain moments, but the red-headed, lanky groupie dancing his heart away reminded me, in a way, that it did not really matter. It was what was playing right in that moment that mattered.



DJ SPOTLIGHT: LAUREN QUIJANO I ACTIVISM FOR AMATEURS, FRI 4-4:30P

How did you choose the topic of your show?

Since I was ten, phrases like social justice and mass movements have excited me. My dad taught me about progressive Filipino youth groups, and I eventually joined a group in high school called Anakbayan in Los Angeles. I learned about grassroots organizing and Filipino American issues. I knew in my heart that I wanted to be an activist for something in college ... anything!

So, I decided to start up my talk show, Activism for Amateurs! The title says it all. I originally wanted a PA show where aspiring activists like me (back when I was a freshman) could learn how to be a better activist and community leader. I was thinking I would present interviews and guests that could give that answer. But I learned over the course of my show that anyone can be an activist. You just need to be passionate about something you believe in, and that activism takes many different shapes and forms, and can be seen in different people. There are all sorts of activists in a variety of careers: a nurse can be a health activist, a teacher can be an activist for education, musicians can create music to facilitate a movement, and community members can help inspire the next generation. What they all have in common is that they speak out for what they stand for. This in itself is a very powerful tool and is what it means to be an activist. An activist does not need to chant on the streets or picket. An activist does not need to be angry. An activist can be anyone.



Does the theme of the show have anything to do with what you're majoring in at UCI?

Definitely. I am currently a double major in Public Health Policy and International Studies. In public health policy, I learned the importance of law and lobbying, and that activist work can help improve health policies. With international studies, my focus is on human rights. I learned a lot about human rights in international organizations, and sometimes feel that organizations like the U.N. get human rights all wrong. I have met so many people who take the concept of human rights to heart. And they truly believe that all people should have these human rights. So who should deny them otherwise? I think activists like them understand because, they live without the things they strive for today. They fight for it.

What sort of guests to you ask to come on?

I love having student leaders who are involved on campus to be on the show. A lot of students at UCI who are involved on-campus generally spend

their extra time to promote good things on campus. A lot of campus events keep an important vision in mind: whether it is for UCI to be a more sustainable environment, for our fellow students to be healthy, or for students to really understand their rights. Other than students, I love to invite community members to talk about how they advocate in their communities. Hip-Hop MC's, the Shining Sons, made one of their first debuts on the air, and talked about their experiences with gang violence in the Long Beach area. I interviewed Pat and Sandy O. from Emma's Revolution on their progressive folk music and their tour across the nation. I even had guests from other countries as well, from activist Elora West and her travels to save dolphins in Japan, to UCI alumni now teaching English abroad in South Korea.

What has been your favorite show, to date?

With very convenient timing, the famous tabla player and musician, Salar Nader, visited the UCI campus with a performance scheduled through the Afghanistan Development Project. I was able to get him to fill in a KUCI interview into his busy schedule! On top of that, we invited musician Sandro Estravi and students studying under the UCI Music Department to have a live jamming session with him on the air. We followed with interviews of course (since its a PA show), but it was so awesome to hear all the different instruments combine into a very ear-gasmic culture clash! It was just awesome. DJ SPOTLIGHT: MICHAEL RYDZYNSKI I CONCERT PREVIEW/ANNIVERSARIES, SAT 9A-12P

When you started DJing at KUCI, you said there were other classical shows. Was there just a lot more interest in classical music back then?

It sure seems that way, doesn't it? I honestly don't know why there aren't more students interested in classical. Maybe I'm scaring away potential customers.

To what do you attribute your longevity at the station?

Stubborn genes? Seriously, I loved doing live radio 36 years ago, when I first started (Jan. 14, 1977), and I still love doing it. I get to play some of my 1,001 favorite works and still have time to try new music. I love giving the backstory to the works and their composers—I've been doing that no matter the theme of my show, whether it be American classical music (Americana), Gershwin music (Gershwinfest), works previously heard at the Claire Trevor School of the Arts (Village Concert; Encore!) or coming up (Concert Preview/Anniversaries). As long as I enjoy doing live radio (and change titles every few years), I'll continue doing radio here. Not a couple of surgeries, not several trips halfway around the world, nor even the Mayans have been able to keep me away.

You've been here through so many changes. What sticks out?

The change from 89.9 to 88.9 FM. Moving out from Gateway Commons into a trailer. Moving the main broadcasting studio. Learning to use the CD machines (I haven't quite entered the 21st century yet). Seeing so many new DJs using PCs and playing from their MP3s, while I stubbornly stick to LPs. (This is beginning to look like an ad for alphabet soup....)

You've said you're related to Beethoven pianistically and percussion-wise, to King Kong. Embellish?

Glad you asked! One of my piano teachers, who taught at UCI for many years, learned piano from Stefan Ashkenase, who was taught by Emil Sauer. Sauer was one of the last students of Franz Liszt, the most famous student of Carl Czerny. And Czerny was Beethoven's prize pupil. Considering that Beethoven studied for a time with Haydn—more in composition than piano—I am thus "related" to Haydn as well as Beethoven and Liszt. (Got all that? There will be a quiz on this....) As for Mr. Kong: one of my percussion teachers was taught by Murray Spivack, the Oscar—winning sound engineer (for "Hello, Dolly!") who was responsible for the audio special effects on the original (1933) version of "King Kong." (I travel in good company.) Another of my percussion teachers played on the soundtrack of "The Ten Commandments," so I'm also "related" to Moses (Charleton Heston, whom I actually got to meet at one of my concerts—sadly, shortly before he died.)



Lastly, what's the best way of helping to grow someone's interest or appreciation of classical music?

Listen to my show, naturally! Every Saturday morning from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. I try to make it entertaining as well as educational. And funny, too: Classical music has some of the strangest, quirkiest bunch of people you'd ever hope (not) to meet! But boy, have they produced some of the best music ever!
